

NOTICE OF RIGHTS

If you are living in foster care or participating in the Foster Youth in Transition Program, you have the rights listed below.

- You have a right to be treated fairly and get the help you need. No matter things like where your family comes from, your skin color, your religion, your culture, the gender you identify as, who you love, or some other things that make you who you are. You may not be threatened, punished, or treated badly because you asked questions or shared concerns about your rights.
- You have a right to adult guidance, support, and supervision that fits your needs in a safe, healthy, and comfortable place where you are treated with fairness, respect, and dignity.
- You have a right to be placed with a foster care provider who knows and understands your history related to your needs, and who has the knowledge and skills to provide for your needs.
- You have a right to connect with your community and supports (unless limited by a law or court order). You have a right to contact people who work with you and can answer your questions and listen to your concerns about your rights.

- You have a right to a reasonable amount of privacy when you communicate
 with others and to have documents about you protected as permitted by law.
- You have a right to an education, transportation to and from school,
 participate in cultural and social activities that fit your age and needs, and stay
 in your school if your placement changes (unless it is not best for you).
- You have a right to things that meet your basic needs like food, clothes, and hygiene products and services that fit your culture and gender identity.
- You have a right to have your medical, dental, and mental health needs met.
- You have a right to a voice in your case, to go to court hearings, to have people you want at your court hearings, to have a say about where you live and plans for your life, and to have an attorney.
- You have a right to things you need as you become an adult like help with money, getting a job or going to school, and learning how to drive a car.
